International Maritime Organization in collaboration with SPREP, SPC and other international organizations dealing with maritime

affairs continues to prioritize the importance of being alert and well prepared in the wake of accidents. This has led to continuous security trainings for all related personnel responsible for implementing, enforcing and monitoring of maritime activities within the region.

The aim is to ensure that the Pacific Island nations would be able to protect their people and environment from those who utilize ships, crew or even passengers onboard as weapons. With the changing technologies from time to time, terrorists have been able to utilize this advancement to their advantage in further exerting their influence. Before they have access to the region's maritime dealings, a number of security trainings including this one attended by the Principal Surveyor of the Maritime Division have already been carried out for all personnel in charge of the Maritime Industry. The purpose of which was to upgrade the knowledge, appropriate skills and techniques in dealing with these types of criminal actions.

While Cruise Ship Pacific Jewel engaged at the Port of Apia in accommodating other members of the SIDS meeting, safety and security not only for the passengers but the vessel as well was strictly adhered to at all times. All responsible maritime personnel including the Maritime Division of the Ministry

of Works, Transport & Infrastructure have been working hard to ensure that safety and security was enforced.

As part of safety issues onboard the ship, the Gray Water from the ship's water tank were treated on the ship's treatment plant before discharging to MV Samoa Express tanks and transferred 12 nautical miles away in open seas for disposal. Representing the Administration to this important activity with the safety monitoring procedures were Aisiga Nauma and loane Efeso. The purpose was to ensure that the stability of the cruise ship was maintained while serving as a floating accommodation for the SIDS Delegates from 27th August to 5th Sept 2014.

the safety and security operation of maritime actions by full compliance with the International Maritime Organization (IMO) Conventions, Protocols, Codes, Standards and Recommended Practices.

Maritime auditing under ISM and ISPS in this regard has become crucially important. This is the first SIDS Global Conference to convene in the Pacific and the 3rd one for its kind since 2005. SIDS is recognized as a distinct group of developing countries facing specific social, economic and environmental vulnerabilities. SIDS commenced on 1st to 4th September 2014 with various side events occuring before and during the official opening of the SIDS. Individuals from our Ministry and each Division participated in the above conference. They were either inspectors of the venues before the SIDS start or the officers responsible for the numerous SIDS official and events.

The Minister for the Ministry of Works, Transport and Infrastructure Manu'alesagalala Enokati Posala spoke at the August side event on Samoa's perspective on "Harnessing the Oceanic Wealth through Trade Specialization as well as Sustainable and Resilient Maritime Transport". The Minister's speech focused mainly on the impacts and vulnerabilities of Samoa's Maritime Transport to climate change and natural disasters. The speech touched on the National Transport Sector Plan and how it provides a coordinated planning framework that promotes a whole Government perspective in the prioritization and funding of investment within the Transport Sector with main concerns in the Maritime Transports as it is the dominant form of transportation in Samoa. In relation to the above issues, the speech clarified the significance of strengthening, enhancing and maintaining all aspects of Maritime services on which Samoa heavily relies on for its Trade Services within Samoa and with the outside world. There were also clarifications of Samoa's national and international responsibilities to uphold adopt and enforce applicable international legislations and regulations to combat serious criminal acts from occurring and minimizing such from happening in our island.

Minister also mentioned the port project at Vaiusu to accommodate bigger ships and its location and condition as sheltered port, in contrast to Matautu Port. This new project must accommodate the impacts of climate change, the depth of channels and quality superstructure to allow for bigger vessels. Further this port will be adopting relevant measures to become a green port. The pressure to protect and conserve the environment globally has also provided challenges for shipping operators including Samoa Shipping Corporation by paying additional compliance and safety costs as per national and international regulations. This speech depicts the validity of Maritime Transportation in Samoa and key measures to resolve such issues.

drainage awareness programs to the public free of charge. The promotion mainly covered the issue of littering whereby green tote bags were printed with eye catching slogans reminding the people to Clean up and pick up for a healthier Samoa as well as informing them that What goes in the water, goes in you so it's always healthy to Keep our Drains Clean! The green colour of the tote bag symbolises a healthy environment with the purple colour of the Slogan representing good judge-

A 2015 Drainage Annual Calendar produced by the LTD team in house was also part of the display package to further remind and inform the school children as messengers to spread the good word of keeping our drains clean.
